#### Mural Project Will Honor a School Built to Last

*Redlands*, *CA* – It took the wrecking ball several tries; the walls did not come down easily. The crew prevailed in the end, and the old buildings fell to make room for the new. But nothing could destroy the memories. The "long blue line" remains.

For students and alumni of Redlands High School, the story likely comes as no surprise. Their school has been a fixture in the community since 1891 and though its face has changed quite a bit through the last dozen decades, the school and all it stands for was clearly built to last. And the Redlands High School that still stands in the memories of a few alumni, known to others – and to current students - only through old photographs and the recollections of parents and grandparents, will soon be rebuilt, in a sense. A project is underway to create a historical mural depicting the early school in all its beauty, and the school invites its alumni to share in bringing the old school back for current and future generations to enjoy.

The mural will cover a large exterior wall of the gymnasium, where it will be visible to those on campus as well as to passers-by. It will depict the original 1891 buildings, plus the historic Clock Auditorium, erected in 1928 and still in use today. Talks are ongoing with local artists, concepts are being laid out, and funds are being raised for the project, which is budgeted at just over \$16,000.

The RHS Class of 2012 has taken up the task. Rather than perpetrating the traditional "senior prank" these Terriers have chosen to channel their energies into something positive and lasting – something that will leave their "pawprint" on the school for future students and the community. Embracing the mural project, last month they initiated a "quarter dump" in which students were asked simply to bring their spare change to school and contribute it toward the mural. Within only a few days' time, the seniors' change drive had netted over \$1,000 – a healthy start toward the goal. Now the Class of 2012 would like to challenge past graduating classes to help create and to share in this legacy.

There are a couple of ways alumni can become involved. A fundraising concert scheduled for July 27<sup>th</sup> will take place in – where else? – Clock Auditorium. "Under the Cowboy Moon" will feature award-winning Western singers and songwriters Belinda Gail and Dave Stamey in a fun and frolicsome evening of cowboy tunes and tales from the trail. Tickets go on sale June 1<sup>st</sup> at \$30 per person. RHS alumni attending the event will receive free door prize tickets, and special recognition will go to the graduating class with the highest number of attendees. All profits from the concert will go toward the mural project.

Alumni who can't attend the concert can also make direct donations to the mural fund; classes contributing a minimum of \$500 toward the project will be recognized by having their graduating class listed as a sponsor on the mural wall. The Class of 2012, which kicked off the project, will be listed first; other classes will be listed in descending order according to their financial contributions.
